Wrigley Field Facts:

- The field was built in 1914.
- This is the 97th season it has hosted Major League Baseball.
- The 95th year to host the Cubs.
- April 20, 1916 the first National League game was played: Cubs over the Cincinnati Reds 7-6 in 11 innings.
- It is the 2nd oldest ballpark in the majors behind Boston's Fenway Park built in 1912.
- Originally known as Weeghman Park.
- In 1926, named in honor of William Wrigley, Jr. the clubs owner.
- 2010 Celebrates its 23rd year of playing under the lights!

Many historic moment have occurred on this field:

- Babe Ruth's "called shot" during Game 3 of the 1932 World Series.
- Pete Rose's 4,191st career hit, which tied him with Ty Cobb for the most hits in baseball history.
- The 1947, 1962 and 1990 All-Star Games.
